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Pastor's POV Dr. William J. McConnell

Near the end of November, my OneDrive account sent a collection of photos from something that had happened exactly ten years earlier. It was the day when our daughter, Abriana, hosted her first Thanksgiving dinner at the big, beautiful home of church members for whom she was "housesitting." That was also the year that an important family tradition got started. After the meal, we went to the living room to watch *The Polar Express*. And for many years thereafter—all the way up through our time in Nebraska—no Thanksgiving would be complete without sitting down to watch this holiday movie classic. No doubt for many of us, favorite holiday films like this are a highlight of the season that we're now entering.

Of course, for the theological purists among us (and may their tribe increase!), such forays into secular holiday traditions are a sacrilege. All the Santa Claus lore is, at best, a distraction from the <u>real</u> meaning of Christmas. At worst, it's a counterfeit belief system that's the very antithesis of the gospel. The omniscient Santa ("he sees you when you're sleeping, he knows when you're awake, etc.) is a substitute deity, who operates on the basis of works righteousness. Good children are rewarded with presents and naughty children get coal. Not much grace in that system!

People responding that way are part of a longstanding Christian tradition of rejecting the trappings of secular culture. For many of the earliest Christians, the world of pagan antiquity was filled with nothing but superstition and falsehood. "What has Athens to do with Jerusalem?" the church father Tertullian famously inquired. The implicit answer: nothing. Christians don't need to have anything to do with the world of classical learning, philosophical inquiry, and pagan mythology.

But there is another alternative. Call it the Mars Hill approach. In his famous discourse delivered to the Athenian philosophers on Mars Hill (the Areopagus), the Apostle Paul used the words of pagan poets to build a bridge to his unbelieving audience. Fraught with error though they were, they grasped fragments of the truth and expressed universal human longings that are ultimately fulfilled in Jesus.

That's how J. R. R. Tolkein and C. S. Lewis looked at the folklore and mythology of cultures around the world. Though rife with error, they still preserve fragments of God's eternal truths. They contain memory traces of divine realities buried in our collective consciousness. In the Christ-event, 'myth became fact' (as the title of a 1944 essay by Lewis put it). What had been vaguely hinted at in the world's myths and legends became a concrete historical reality in Jesus.

Just like Paul used the writings of pagan philosophers to build a bridge to his unbelieving audience, we can use classic holiday films to illuminate the Christmas message and tap into the longings of people everywhere that Jesus came to fulfill.

That's what we'll be doing this month—up through Christmas Eve. Check out the schedule of messages. You may want to indulge in some holiday movie watching this month in conjunction with the sermon series. (Every movie we're discussing this month is available for purchase right inside the entrance to HyVee.) And come to worship prepared for a new spin on the old, familiar story of Christmas.

We look forward to seeing you in worship. Our family extends to all of you our wishes for a blessed and joyous season of Advent and of Christmas.


Stewardship Campaign
