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Pastor's POV Dr. William J. McConnell

The David story looms large in the biblical imaginations of any of us with a church upbringing. Virtually the only series of Vacation Bible School lessons I remember are from the year I was in kindergarten and the week focused on David. In my mind's eye I can still picture myself and my classmates in Primary Department Sunday School singing "Only a boy named David"—our little fingers making the motions of the rippling brook, our arms swinging as we sang about the sling going round and round, and, finally, all of us tumbling down to the floor like the giant. Years later, as a college student, I was privileged to sit under the ministry of one of the most gifted Bible expositors I've ever encountered. For a couple of years, his Sunday evening messages went through the David narrative, chapter by chapter. Many of the insights gleaned from that series have stayed with me for the past 40 years and they will no doubt show up in my messages this fall.

To whatever extent we're captivated by the David story, our attention is not misplaced. First of all, it's central to the biblical narrative. Old Testament scholar Walter Brueggemann says: "David is the dominant figure in Israel's narrative... More than any other person, Israel is fascinated by David, deeply attracted to him, bewildered by him, occasionally embarrassed by him, but never disowning him." Spanning parts of three Old Testament books (1 and 2 Samuel and 1 Kings), the David story includes 65 chapters and 40,000 words. Were it a book to itself, it would be the longest one in the Bible. In fact, not only does it stand out in the biblical record for its length, it also stands out in the annals of antiquity. Robert Alter says the David story "is probably the greatest single narrative representation in antiquity of a human life evolving by slow stages through time, shaped and altered by the pressures of political life, public institutions, family, the impulses of body and spirit, the eventual sad decay of the flesh."

Secondly, as Alter implies, David's story is the quintessential human story. Eugene Peterson says: "The theme of the David story is becoming human. What does it mean to be human, become human, be a real woman, a real man?" In terms of psychological depth and tangled plotlines, the David narrative has Shakespearean overtones, except, as one critic observed, to rival the David saga, you would have to combine Macbeth, Hamlet, and King Lear. His was truly (as I've entitled my sermon series) a "life lived large." Everything he did was done on a grand scale. David engaged in magnanimous gestures that virtually defy comprehension. And yet, when he messed up, he messed up royally! It's as if we're looking at ordinary human traits in exaggerated proportions.

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With his sometimes-cut-throat tactics, underhanded machinations, and chaotic family life, David is hardly an exemplary role model. What he offers, instead, according to some biblical interpreters (like Peterson) is a template for "earthly spirituality"—a "man after God's own heart" (as he's called in 1 Samuel 13:14) who nonetheless operates in the nitty-gritty, Byzantine, rough-and-tumble world of Ancient Near Eastern geopolitical power struggles.

Finally, as with all of Scripture, we ultimately focus on David in order to enhance our understanding of and commitment to Jesus, the new and greater David. To again quote Peterson, "The David story anticipates the Jesus story. The Jesus story presupposes the David story." In the Contemporary English Version, the opening words of the New Testament (in Matthew 1:1) are "Jesus Christ came from the family of King David. . ."—the first of 54 New Testament references to Israel's illustrious king. Repeatedly, Jesus is identified (or addressed) as the "Son of David." The whole messianic hope Jesus came to fulfill began with the dream of a restored Davidic monarchy. Without David, we'd have no notion of a "Christ" (literally one anointed, as David was) or a Savior who is a king. The Christmas story is incompressible without its background in the story of David and his Bethlehem roots—just as the story of the Passion and resurrection would never have taken the form it did without the (ostensibly) Davidic Psalms and their portrayal of the Righteous Sufferer (e.g., Psalm 22) and the one who defies death (e.g., Psalm 16).

With all these considerations in mind, our sermon series this fall will take us through the ups and downs of David's fateful and tumultuous life. We'll see him as a shepherd boy, giant killer, outlaw, king, and fallen hero. Along the way, we'll hopefully gain insights into what makes up a life well lived—qualities to embrace and pitfalls to avoid. And we'll hopefully also be strengthened in our relationship with Jesus Christ, David's greater son. I look forward to seeing you in worship—and at other events this fall!

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


Adult Sunday School
