Easter Sunrise

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I'll never forget the Easter of 2006. I had started serving the First Presbyterian Church in Fremont, Ohio at the beginning of the year. And during the first half of that year, I conducted funerals for almost a dozen members of our congregation. One of the first was for a mom in her early 40's who had served on the PNC that brought me to Fremont. On Ash Wednesday, I placed the sign of ashes on the forehead of a middle-aged man facing surgery the next day, repeating the traditional words "Greg, remember you are dust and to dust you shall return." Following the service, the elders and I laid hands on him and prayed that the Lord would bring him through the procedure. Twenty-four hours later, I was praying over his lifeless body in a hospital operating room. In one weekend alone, I led three funerals: Saturday morning, Saturday afternoon, and Sunday afternoon.

April rolled around that year, and in the article I wrote for the church newsletter, I started by saying, "We need Easter more than ever this year." As a congregation, we needed to lift up the hope of the resurrection in an especially emphatic way and reclaim the comforting conviction that death and evil do not have the final word.

The circumstances that year were rather unusual, but the statement I made in that article is one that could, with varying degrees of appropriateness, be made every single year. In 2021, some of us expressed the sentiment that Easter was especially welcome because we felt as though we had been going through Lent for all of the preceding year.

This year, we approach the celebration of Easter in the wake of yet another school shooting that took the lives of 9-year old children and a trio of school staff members. Day after day, in recent months, we've witnessed scenes of destruction in communities devastated by a near-record setting wave of deadly tornados. We need Easter as much this year as ever.

The Cross is a powerful symbol that God is never absent in the midst of tragedies and injustices. In Christ, God has borne the pain of human suffering and evil. God is not idly indifferent when terrible things happen. God has fully entered into the human experience and plunged into the depths of our brokenness.

Then, the Empty Tomb demonstrates Christ's victory over death and all that it represents. That means that we personally can have the hope of eternal life. But it means so much more. As Adam Hamilton reminded us in the recently completed video series on John's gospel, it is not any coincidence that this gospel-writer described the setting of Jesus' tomb as a garden (John 19:41) and had Mary Magdalene thinking that the Risen Christ might be the gardener (John 20:15).

Having opened his gospel with an unmistakable allusion to Genesis 1, John wants us to see that the resurrection of Jesus is nothing other than the dawn of God's new creation. The long-awaited restoration of Eden (Isa. 51:3, Ezek. 36:35) had begun. And implicit in that promise of the Garden of Eden restored to its pristine state is the idea that all the horrible things besetting human existence in the present world—the loss of loved ones, pandemics, atrocities, natural disasters—won't just be eradicated. They will be undone! Somehow, in God's recreated world, their effect will be reversed.

Perhaps no one has expressed that idea more powerfully than Fyodor Dostoevsky in *The Brothers Karamazov*: "I believe like a child that suffering will be healed and made up for, that all the humiliating absurdity of human contradictions will vanish like a pitiful mirage, like the despicable fabrication of the impotent and infinitely small Euclidean mind of man, that in the world's finale, at the moment of eternal harmony, something so precious will come to pass that it will suffice for all hearts, for the comforting of all resentments, for the atonement of all the crimes of humanity, of all the blood that they've shed; and it will make it not only possible to forgive but to justify what has happened." That is a sweeping, daring assertion—that in history's final denouement, every bad thing that ever happened will be "healed and made up for" as well as justified.

That's the truth that comes to us when we need it—when we need Easter—the most. I look forward to seeing you this week as we journey to the Cross and then celebrate the resurrection victory.




Confirmation & Adult Inquirers Class

Maundy Thursday
