

When I started out in our church's Baptist Youth Fellowship (BYF), it was a rather staid affair. We were virtually all the offspring of church members. On Sunday evenings, we donned our jackets and ties or dresses (depending on gender), sat in the rows of wooden chairs in a Sunday School classroom, and sang choruses like "Do, Lord" and "Christ for Me," as Miss Blair accompanied us on the piano. The officers sat a table in the front of the room and, at some point in


the meeting, the minutes were read and approved. There was a devotional. We gathered around the table for a prayer circle and then closed with the Mizpah Benediction.

But then, sometime in my early adolescence, a development took place that shook up our staid, comfortable church routine. An establishment called the Jesus Christ Coffeehouse opened up on the main street through our neighborhood of Philadelphia. Soon, young people from the community, including students at the local high school, began congregating there and many of them started experiencing life-changing spiritual conversions. A teacher who noticed the transformed lives of his students went to the coffee house to investigate—and he wound up committing his life to Christ. We began holding testimony services at the church, and scores of young people would come and bear witness to how Christ had saved them out of a life of drug addiction or some other troubled past.

The churches that were open to what God seemed to be doing in our community experienced a spiritual re-awakening. The perfunctory altar call at the end of the service (usually an opportunity for people to walk forward and declare their intention to join on a letter of transfer from some other church) became a time when people were coming to make first time professions of faith. In the past, all the local church youth groups would periodically come together for Christian Endeavor hymn sings. Now, the various churches were organizing contemporary musical ensembles with instruments like guitars and drums. Youth events were re-energized by newcomers who brought fresh spiritual passion.

What we were witnessing in our little section of Philadelphia was a local manifestation of a movement sweeping the country—and now depicted in the film, *The Jesus Revolution*. Even if I remained one of the jacket-and-tie, hymn-singing traditionalists, I'm glad I had at least a brief

exposure to that spiritual awakening. It left a lasting impression on me. But by the time I was in high school, the real energy had dissipated. Before shutting down, the coffeehouse had become a notorious hangout and a nuisance for the local police precinct. But I've often wondered about all those young people who underwent such a dramatic, life-changing experience and gave such compelling testimonies. Did they develop a mature Christian faith and go on to lifetimes of discipleship and service? Or was it a passing fad?

Spiritual mountaintop experiences can be very powerful. But they ultimately need to be translated into long-lasting forms of discipleship. In the gospels, there's an account of a literal mountaintop experience, when a handful of Jesus' disciples witnessed his so-called transfiguration (Matt. 17:1-8). And they responded the way we customarily respond to spiritual mountaintops—they wanted to "freeze the moment in time" by building little shelters and staying there (vs. 4). But Jesus rejected the idea. They had to go back down into the valley, where there were hurting people (like a boy who was evidently an epileptic). For Jesus, it was the moment when he embarked on the journey to the Cross.

It's been gratifying in the past month to see signs of a fresh spiritual awakening among college students—first at Asbury University and then (by way of a ripple effect) at other schools. Only eternity will reveal the full impact of what is taking place. But we earnestly hope that this movement of the Spirit produces true and lasting fruits of revival. That's certainly been the track record of authentic revivals in the past, which have provided an impetus for church expansion, social reform, missionary ventures, and other major spiritual breakthroughs.

Our own congregation is arguably the by-product of powerful spiritual awakenings. It was organized in the immediate aftermath of the Layman's Prayer Revival (starting in 1867). And although I can't prove it, it appears to me as though that revival movement may have precipitated the denominational merger that led to Rev McCartney's Nebraska mission. In the early 1890's, the Lord sent revival to our congregation and so many people came to faith that a new sanctuary had to be built—the one in which we are still worshipping.

What the Lord has done in the past, he can do again! We're grateful for the faithful prayer warriors who are beseeching God every Monday evening to send a fresh spiritual awakening to our village and to protect it from spiritual threats. May all of us be open to renewal in our lives and see fruits of lasting change.



Wednesdays in Lent: Soup Supper & Bible Study



If you haven't yet attended a Wednesday night soup supper and Bible study, you're missing out on a wonderful opportunity for fellowship and spiritual enrichment during the Lenten season. A simple meal of soup and bread is served starting at 6:30 pm. At 7:00 pm, we open with a brief evening prayer liturgy followed by a short teaching on John's gospel delivered via video by influential pastor and author Adam Hamilton (United Methodist Church of the Resurrection,

Leawood, KS). For the remainder of the hour (up until 8:00 pm), Rev. McConnell offers additional insights and leads a discussion on the evening's topic from John's gospel. The series continues every Wednesday evening up until March 29. Join us when you are able!
