

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Pastor's POV Dr. William J. McConnell

Like so many of you, I woke up on the morning of October 7 to the devastating news of the Hamas attack on Israel and the outbreak of war. It's the latest round in an endless cycle of bloody conflict that has continued throughout Israel's history. And, unfortunately, those of us with a strong religious mindset are often not well-suited to grapple with the complexities of an issue like this one. As people of faith, we're naturally prone to see things in absolutist terms, as a stark contrast between good versus evil. We want to know who the 'good guys' and 'bad guys' are so we can be on the right side.


For a lot of conservative evangelical folks—whose view of the Bible is often shaped by the theology of dispensationalism (popularized in end-times scenarios like the Left Behind series)—it's all quite simple. The Jews are God's chosen people. God promises to bless those who show favor to them (Genesis 12:3)—and that's interpreted to mean giving uncritical support to the modern nation-state of Israel. God has given the entire land of historic Palestine to the Jewish people and so everyone else should just get out!

At the same time, mainline Protestant denominations (like the PCUSA) tend to track very closely with the socio-political agenda of the secular left and to be influenced by a Marxist-inspired brand of 'liberationist' theology. So, every issue gets filtered through the prism of the oppressed and the oppressors. In the case of Israel, the Zionists are considered neo-colonial oppressors, the Palestinian Arabs are the oppressed people group. That means that our denomination takes a fairly pro-Palestinian stance. Our own presbytery has periodically sponsored forums that dish out one-sided, misleading information from this perspective.

Neither approach, in my estimation, represents a responsible Christian position. There's a reason even some of leading luminaries of American diplomacy—Henry Kissinger, Jimmy Carter, James Baker, and others—have been unable to resolve the conflict in the Middle East. The issues seem to be intractable. There are competing claims and counterclaims, and a long litany of mutual grievances, provocations, recriminations, and missed opportunities.

There's no question that Palestinian Arabs have experienced mistreatment—by Israelis and residents of their settlements as well as by fellow Arabs. Conditions in Gaza, especially, are deplorable. The Gaza strip has almost the exact same number of square miles as the city of Omaha. Yet it has a population of over two million. If you think Omaha is a densely populated city, imagine more than quadrupling the number of people living there. It would be like the entire population of Nebraska—and then some—being packed into the Omaha city limits. Add to that the blockade, high rates of unemployment, poverty, and food insecurity, and it makes for intolerable conditions—a situation, it's important to point out, for which Israel is not entirely to blame.

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But none of this in any way justifies the horrific atrocities carried out by Hamas: gunning down young revelers at a dance festival in the desert, torturing kibbutz residents and burning them alive, kidnapping people, including little children and the elderly. People cheering on actions like these or attempting to excuse them are morally repugnant. Hamas is a terrorist group whose charter calls for the creation of an Islamic state encompassing the whole of Israel/Palestine. No nation-state in Israel's position could refrain from eliminating a threat like this.

The important thing to bear in mind is that it's possible indeed, in this case, morally obligatory—to hold competing considerations in tension. We should share in the outrage and horror of Israeli citizens and understand their quest to protect their security interests. We should also grieve over the plight of innocent Palestinian Arabs living in Gaza—through no choice of their own who are now bearing the heavy brunt of the Israeli response. Some of them (a shrinking minority) are Christian brothers and sisters. Although I can't always accept their analysis of the sociopolitical realities, I try to be attentive to what fellow believers in institutions like Bethlehem Bible College (on the occupied West Bank) are saying and I understand their pain. It's especially distressing to hear them express their sense of abandonment by fellow evangelicals in the US who are so unrestrained in their support for Israel. Within the past few weeks, an Israeli airstrike caused the collapse of an annex building at Gaza's Greek Orthodox Church of St. Porphyrius, said to be the third oldest church in the world. People taking shelter in the sacred precincts of their church building lost their lives. One parishioner told a reporter: "We were baptized here, and we will die here." Former Rep. Justin Amash (R-Mich) shared photos of his family members killed at the site, and he pointed out that they were devout Christians, in no way affiliated with terrorism.

The ancient Jewish rabbis came up with a style of commentary on the biblical text called midrash—essentially a pious embellishment of the storyline. One such midrash describes the angels in heaven breaking out in celebration after the Egyptian army was drowned in the Red Sea. Then, they noticed that God was not joining in the celebration. In fact, he was weeping. "Lord," one of the angels said. "Aren't You happy? You saved Your people." The Lord replied, "But did you see how many of My people I had to kill?"

My theology—unlike that of my dispensationalist friends—is not dependent on the continual existence of the Jewish people as an identifiable ethnic group. However, the witness of history leads me to believe that God still has some kind of plan and purpose for his people of the older covenant. If that's the case, it's possible that the modern nation-state of Israel and the steps that are needed to safeguard its existence work into that plan. But I also have to believe that God weeps over the suffering that is coming upon both the citizens of Israel as well as their Palestinian neighbors. We should respond in the same way. 
Guest Preacher
