

Back in the heyday of rail travel, virtually every major city in America had a "Union Station"— often with a magnificent grand concourse and other elaborate architectural features. (Omaha's old Union Station is, of course, now the Durham Museum.) Jointly operated by multiple railroad companies, the Union Station was where all their rail-lines converged, allowing passengers to switch carriers. I well remember the days when I would take Amtrak trains home to Philadelphia, changing over to a commuter rail line at 30th Street Station—essentially Philadelphia's "Union Station."

That's an image that, it seems to me, provides an apt metaphor for understanding the coming of Jesus into the world—the event we celebrate this month—and the gospel accounts of his life and ministry. They are basically the Bible's Union Station!

Reading through the Old Testament, you can trace a wide range of different themes and images. There's the theology of creation, Eden, and new creation. There's the concept of the divine image embedded in humanity. There's redemption, the sacrificial lamb, the temple, and priesthood. You also have images of rulership, the ideal Davidic king, and the messianic promise. There's the suffering servant and the model of the righteous sufferer (as in Job).

You can trace a lot of these themes back to Genesis, essentially the seedbed of biblical theology. Throughout the rest of the Old Testament, they crop up here and there, receiving varying degrees of emphasis in different books and at different time periods. To some extent, they're like parallel lines of thought, not necessarily correlated with one another or synthesized in any way.

Then, suddenly, with the arrival of Jesus and the way the gospels depict him, it is as if all the themes of the Bible come together and find their fulfillment. He emerges as the great center, the convergence point, of the biblical narrative. After that, the themes radiate outwards again, as various New Testament writers reflect on the significance of Jesus in light of different Old Testament images. In Romans, for example, he's the second Adam. In Ephesians, he's the cornerstone of the new Temple. In Hebrews, he's the great high priest. Finally, the biblical story comes to a close with the book of Revelation, where many biblical themes culminate in the eschatological vision of a new creation.

The Christmas story can be traced all the way back to the first book of the Bible. And even in the earliest stage of development, we see the kernel of the message that still gives us hope today: that evil has been defeated, that we're blessed to be a blessing, that Jesus is the perfect ruler this world longs for. Join us as you are able during this Advent season.

Just like Jesus is the center—the "Union Station" as it were of the Bible, he should also be the center of our lives. And he should be at the center of our Christmas celebration. I encourage you to find ways of doing that. Make worship—and special times of worship, like Christmas Eve—a priority. Take up the discipline of reading through this year's Advent devotional booklet. Engage in times of fellowship with our church family. Find ways to serve neighbors in need. Make a special gift to ministries that spread the message of Jesus.

May this be a blessed Advent and Christmas season for all of us!


Advent Dinner




Keep Filling the SENCA Cart

Shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child








